Opportunities to Serve the Lord - David Combe

As Covid restrictions are eased and at long last we are able to return a semblance of normality and look forward to attending services, meeting friends and taking part in other church activities.

Thanks to our minister's leadership and the tremendous work he has put in during the pandemic, ably assisted by a number of volunteers, we were able to join in fellowship to worship the Lord either online or in person albeit subject to physical distancing etc.

Moving forward, we need to look at how our church works, how we can carry out the tasks or jobs which need to be done either in relation to the church building and grounds, our congregation and membership and how we serve the Lord in our community.

To do this we rely on people who give up their time and use their skills or talents to carry out duties and tasks to ensure our church functions. People who are willing to step forward and give their best.

Most of you will know that a few years back, the Kirk Session delegated the carrying out of tasks and certain duties to a number of teams made up from volunteers from our congregation.

I have listed the teams and a brief summary of some of their responsibilities below -

- Property Develop a programme of maintenance and renewal of church fabric. Oversee special building and fabric projects as requested by the Kirk Session. Health and Safety of buildings and surrounding areas. Oversee all Church Gardens,
- Worship Encourage participation in worship services by church members. Develop new initiatives in worship. Develop

participation of children and youth in worship. Plan services with the minister on a regular basis.

- Finance Maintain and control Burnhead's finances: overall income, expenditure, budget, forecasts to be reported to the Kirk Session as and when determined by the Kirk Session. Oversee the work of the Treasurer. Oversight and promotion of the Gift Aid and WFO schemes.
- Young People Oversight of the summer Kid's Club. Develop ways to interact with young people in their own language. Produce a Youth Strategy to include all young people up to age of 25.
- Pastoral Care Oversee of the current Pastoral Care system and Visiting Team. Developing new approaches for pastoral care/visitation in the Congregation.
- Communication Publicity, IT, Website, livestreaming of services and this magazine. Develop ways to communicate between Teams and church members so that everyone knows what is going on.
- Welcome To look at ways we as a church can improve on how we welcome people who come here to worship. To look at ways we can make everyone who comes to worship in this church feel that they are among friends. To consider ways we can welcome those in our community who are marginalised, who feel they don't belong, who are excluded for whatever reason into our church.

As I stated above, our church relies on people giving up their time to serve. Many are members of more than one team and increasingly fewer people are having to do more.

If the present situation continues there is a danger that we will struggle to carry out some tasks and jobs. This could impact on our

ability to carry out God's work in our church and our community.

We need more volunteers to join the teams. If you are fit and able, consider stepping up and helping your church. You don't need any special skills or talents, just be prepared to help to serve the Lord.

If you are interested or have any questions, please feel free to speak to the minister or any of the elders.

GIRLS' BRIGADE REPORT – MICHELLE MILLER

Girls' Brigade were finally allowed back to face to face meetings on Wednesday 6th October. We had a very strict risk assessment to complete prior to starting back which (partly my fault) delayed our start up for a few weeks. We hadn't met since



Wednesday 18th March 2020, therefore a long time has passed.

On our enrolment night we enrolled 15 Juniors and 3 Brigaders. We have since added another 4 Juniors, therefore a total of 22 girls currently attending. At the point of writing this we have only met for 4 weeks in total (one being enrolment night). So far all is going well and the girls are glad to be back. We have some new girls, however a lot of them have come back from the previous year which is good. We currently have no Explorers - a few of them have returned but have now moved into the Juniors. It was amazing to see how much the girls had grown in the time that we hadn't met!

During lock-down we put weekly tasks onto our Facebook page and sent text messages to all the girls. We had Sophie Green take part in every single activity we applied, with some other girls taking part on various weeks. We are not sure if there were others taking part, but not letting us see their finished work, but it was good to see what some of the girls did.

We are currently meeting the girls for an hour per week with Juniors running 6pm – 7pm and Brigaders running 7:15pm – 8.15pm. We have done this due to Brigaders still having to socially distance and wear face masks. With the numbers we have we haven't done too much in the way of recruitment, we will continue with the girls we have for the time being, and reasses as we go.

As you know things are changing all of the time, and we are slowly but surely getting back to some sort of normality. Although we aren't recruiting as such, if you do know of any girls who would like to attend we will be more than happy to have them join.

We are currently taking it week by week, and can hopefully review some of the things we are currently doing after Christmas.

Property

Since the last magazine, we have had to put new water heater in extension ladies toilet after the previous unit failed and was beyond repair.

We have purchased a water boiler for kitchen.

The Manse is suffering subsidence on rear of property at the garden side – our insurers have been informed and the matter is currently in within their remit.

In order to help alleviate our ongoing storage space issues, we have had a cupboard built in the link corridor which will be sued to store the food we distribute within the community. This was being stored in the Session Room during lockdown but now the crèche has restarted there was a need to have it moved elsewhere.

We are now taking Hall Lets again with AA and Al Anon back on. Gamblers Anonymous and the Crochet Club are also regulars – aswell as bringing some welcome revenue into the church it is also good to see the church buildings providing a service to the community again.

We will be looking for someone to cut grass in memorial garden next year please speak to me if you can. In addition, we are also looking for cleaners – if you would like to volunteer please could you speak to me - it would be appreciated.

Finance Report

Thank you to everyone for handing in envelopes, donations and standing orders to our Church, without these we could not function.

In July we're still working on a deficit of year to date of £1502.22.

In August we had income of £4,847.80 and expenditure of £4,274.39, a surplus of £573.41 and a year to date figure of minus £928.81.

A gas bill of £331.48 and our monthly Ministry and Mission of £2,807.30 which we pay from January till October. We also got a plaque for the garden in memory of our dear friend Bill Wood. Stationery costs for Les for the last few months had amounted to £161.90. We had a couple of retiral offerings - £84.71 to the Girls Brigade and £61.40 to the fund for rescued dogs.

In September we had income of £4,651.97 and expenditure of £3,681.51 giving us a surplus of £970.51 and a year to date figure of plus £41.65. Just the usual expenditure - we have council tax of £217 every month and insurance of £184.80 monthly. Retiral offering of £95 went to Marys Meals.

From the Building Fund we had to pay out £110.87 for a new water heater for the ladies toilet in the extension. We also had to replace the old cupboard just outside the kitchen and built a new one at a cost of £214.99.

In October we had income of £9,529.35 and expenditure of £4,294.32 giving us a surplus of £5,235.03 or the month and a year to date surplus of £5,276.68. We received a rebate from HMRC of £6,431.65. This is through the Gift Aid scheme that members of the congregation have signed up to if they are tax payers. We are also allowed a certain amount to claim on 'non gift aided' offerings. This amount was for some of last year

and the first 6 months of this year. If anyone is interested in joining the Gift Aid scheme please speak to David Green. This rebate is the difference between us being in credit at the end of the year and being able to carry forward funds to next year.

We had to pay out this month for our music licence and our streaming licence £526.56. Our fire extinguishers were serviced at a cost of £216 and we had a £60 retiral offering to the Children's Cancer ward in Queen Elizabeth hospital.

Hamilton Presbytery

As you may be aware, Hamilton Presbytery will cease to exist on the 31st of December 2021 as we join with Lanark Presbytery in the formation of a new Presbytery. It seems likely that in the summer of 2022, this new Presbytery will itself join up with Falkirk Presbytery to create another new, even bigger, Presbytery.

This follows instructions from the General Assembly as it strives to reshape the church into a more fit for purpose model.

The changes from General Assembly also include changes to the number of ministerial posts and churches in each area and we are at this moment in the first steps of discussion with our neighbouring parishes to explore how those targets can be met and how the changes can be implemented.

Be assured that the Kirk Session of Burnhead Church will leave no stone unturned to secure the future of this church in this community
