A Message from the Manse

So, the man cried out in despair "Touch me God, and let me know you are here," whereupon God reached down and touched the man. But the man brushed the butterfly away and he walked on.

There is a song that was popular back when I went to Sunday School; its chorus line has these words. 'Count your blessings, name them one by one – count your blessings, see what the Lord has done – count your blessings, name them one by one – and you will be amazed by what the Lord has done'

I am often amazed by what the Lord has done. I've lost count of the number of times that God has been at work in Burnhead. Sceptics would probably just call those times co-incidences but I prefer to think of them as God-incidences. Like the times when worship organisers working independently on Sunday and midweek services, choose Bible readings and hymns that couldn't compliment each other more if it was just one person co-ordinating everything. The times when someone has spoken a word of support or encouragement to someone they don't normally speak to and they don't really know why they did it – and yet the person who received the word of encouragement often had a prayer answered in a miraculous way.

Other times have been more dramatic, like the funeral I conducted where I told the story of the little bugs in a pond that become beautiful dragonflies – symbolic of the difference between our bodies here on earth compared with the bodies God has prepared for us in Heaven. Little did I know that the daughter of the deceased studied dragonflies as a hobby and had a 'Damascan' type of experience on hearing the story, releasing the Christian that was hidden within her.

I think if we took the time to reflect on our day, each day, and in the prayerful presence of our Lord ask him to reveal how he has worked in our lives that day. I think we would be amazed by how much and how often God does work in our lives.

So instead of being like the man who sought God in so many ways but failed to see him, let us open our hearts, our ears and our eyes, so that we do not miss out on appreciating God's many blessings in our lives because it wasn't packaged the way we expected it to be.

The property Committee wish all members of the congregation a happy and prosperous year in 2016.

Over the year 2015 the committee spent £30,478 on the maintenance of the Church and halls. Also £2,877 was spent on manse maintenance. At present we are in the process of building an extension to the building, the Jubilee Hall which will benefit the whole congregation.

At present we have planning permission and building warrants. Two cost quotations have been received for the building of extension.

We are starting to fund raise for the Jubilee Hall build and once we have 3 quotations we will put application to presbytery for permission to go for funding grants.

The committee are committed to the upkeep of the Church and halls and we would like to take this opportunity to thank all who contribute through the building repair fund envelopes and all others for their kind donations.


Reflections Service

We also raised a further $£_{150}$ by selling costume jewellery for the Jubilee fund so well done kids.


We done a Hymn in sign language at Christmas – 'come join the celebrations' – which we only had around half an hours training for but it all went very well.

<u>Death – A Wonderful Way to Explain It</u>

A sick man turned to his doctor as he was preparing to leave the examination room and said, "Doctor, I am afraid to die. Tell me what lies on the other side." Very quietly the doctor said, "I don't know." "You don't know? You're a Christian man and don't now what's on the other side?"

The doctor was holding the handle of the door, on the other side came a sound of scratching and whining, and as he opened the door a dog sprang into the room and leaped on him with an eager show of gladness. Turning to the patient the doctor said, "Did you notice my dog? He's never been in this room before. He didn't know what was inside. He knew nothing except that his master was here, and when the door opened he sprang in without fear."

"I know little of what is on the other side of death, but I do know one thing... I know my Master is there and that is enough."

Sign of The Fish

In the early days of Christianity it could be very dangerous to admit that you were one of Jesus' followers. You could be arrested, imprisoned and killed, simply for your beliefs.



Christians had to meet in secret – but how could you tell if a stranger was a Christian or not? Who could you trust?

Christians used secret signs to recognise one another. And one of these was the sign of the fish which could easily be scratched on a wall or drawn in the dust of the road. If the other person wasn't a Christian they'd just think you were doodling. The fish was used as sign because, in Greek, the first letters of the words 'Jesus Christ God's Son Saviour' spell `ichthus', the Greek word for fish.

How can you show other people today that you are a Christian? If you have the joy of knowing Jesus in your heart then it should show on your face!

Secret Writing

The fish was a secret sign. If you would like to send someone a secret message, you can do it with `invisible ink'. You need a lemon or an onion. Squeeze the juice of either into a small bowl. Using the juice as ink, with a clean nib in a proper pen, write your message on a piece of paper. Leave it to dry and as it dries the message will disappear. To make it reappear, hold the paper over a lamp or radiator. This is a very easy way of sending secret messages ... but you have to be sure that the person you are writing to knows the secret of how to make the message reappear!

<u>Crochét Club</u> meet on Tuesday mornings in the Extension.


