A few months after he was called to his new charge, a minister could not believe the amount of apathy that had been allowed, by former ministers and members, to take root and grow. He wanted to have a team of members to commit themselves to a visitation of all members, to encourage them to come to church, and to increase their time and talents to the activities he wanted to begin. He was met with negative responses like "A visitation? That's never been done here before. They wouldn't like that."

The minster got so vexed and depressed about the apathy - or the sloth, as the last of the Seven Deadly Sins is called – of the people, he sent to every member of the church an invitation to attend a funeral! So, at the time on the day in the church as intimated on the invitation, hundreds of people appeared. Many began to mutter to each other, "Who's died?"

The service was moving, and, at times, most personal. Then, after the benediction had been pronounced, the minister did a strange thing: He opened the coffin and asked all who were present to form an orderly queue in order to file past in respect and sorrow. As they did, each was horrified to see that the coffin was empty, except for a mirror which was set in such a position that all who looked in saw only themselves. Many got the message that 'day of the funeral' for they realised that without their presence and their support, through their time and their talents, the local church, their church would die.

Now that is what I call a Resurrection story!

Take yesterday's worries and sort them all out


And you'll wonder whatever you worried about;

Amazing But True

I am the proud possessor of a fabulous building in which I live in comfort and security. Let me tell you about some of the systems and properties.

The building is held together by 202 girders of varying sizes. Inside there is a complicated array of plumbing, in all some 60,000 miles of pipes. The environment is thermostatically controlled to an exact temperature. Christmas Health and Safety Notice

All persons planning to dash through the snow in a one horse open sleigh, going over the fields and laughing all the way are advised that a risk assessment will be required addressing the safety of an open sleigh for members of the public. This assessment must also consider whether it is appropriate to use only one horse for such a venture, particularly where there are multiple passengers.

Please note that permission must also be obtained in writing from landowners before their fields may be entered.

To avoid offending those not participating in celebrations, we would request that laughter is moderate only and not loud enough to be considered a noise nuisance.

Benches, stools, and orthopaedic chairs are now available for collection by any shepherds planning or required to watch their flocks at night. While provision has also been made for remote monitoring of flocks by CCTV cameras from a centrally heated shepherd observation hut, all users of this facility are reminded that an emergency response plan must be submitted to account for know risks to the flocks.

<u>Crochét Club</u> meet on Tuesday mornings in the Extension.


